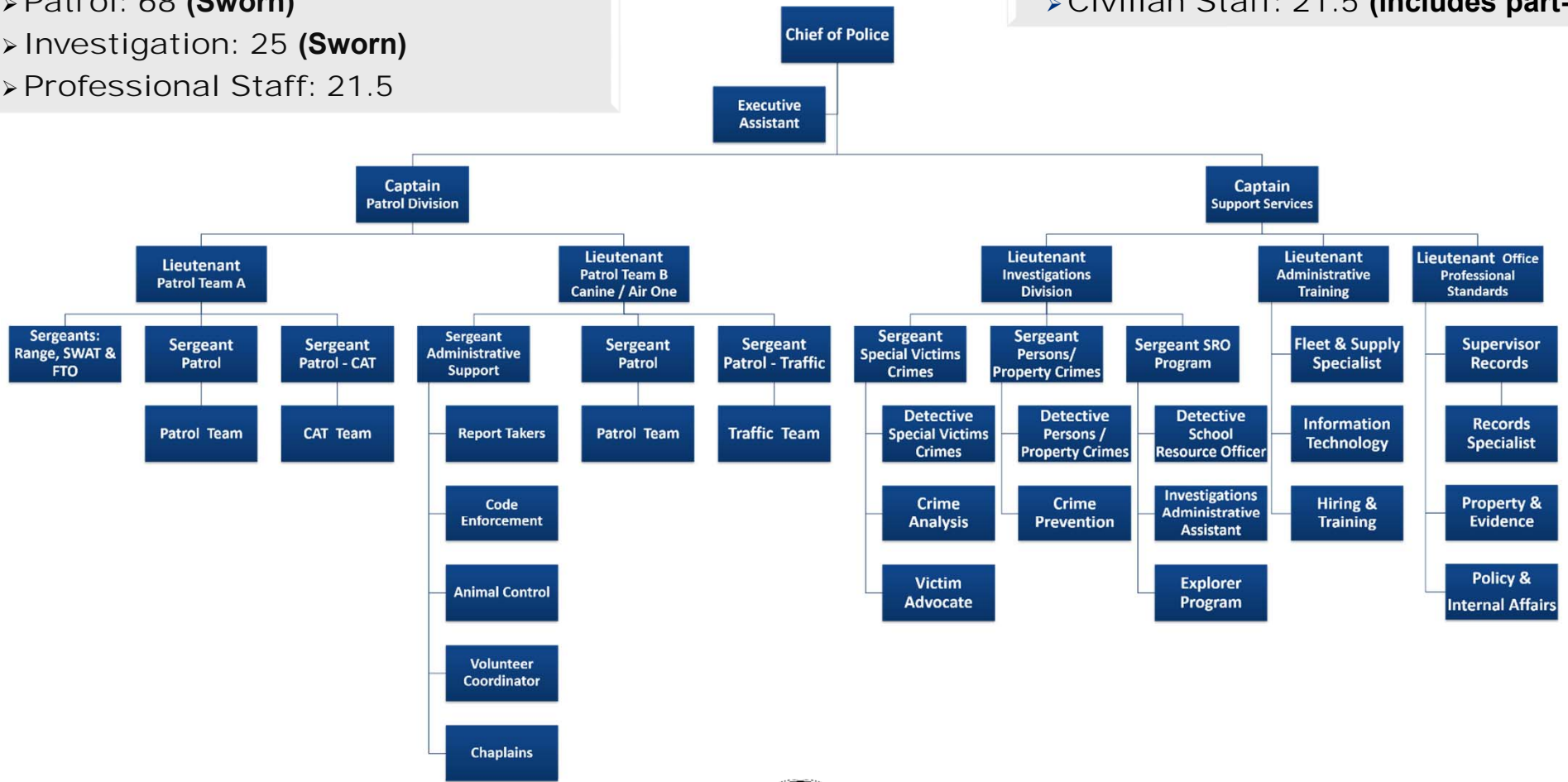

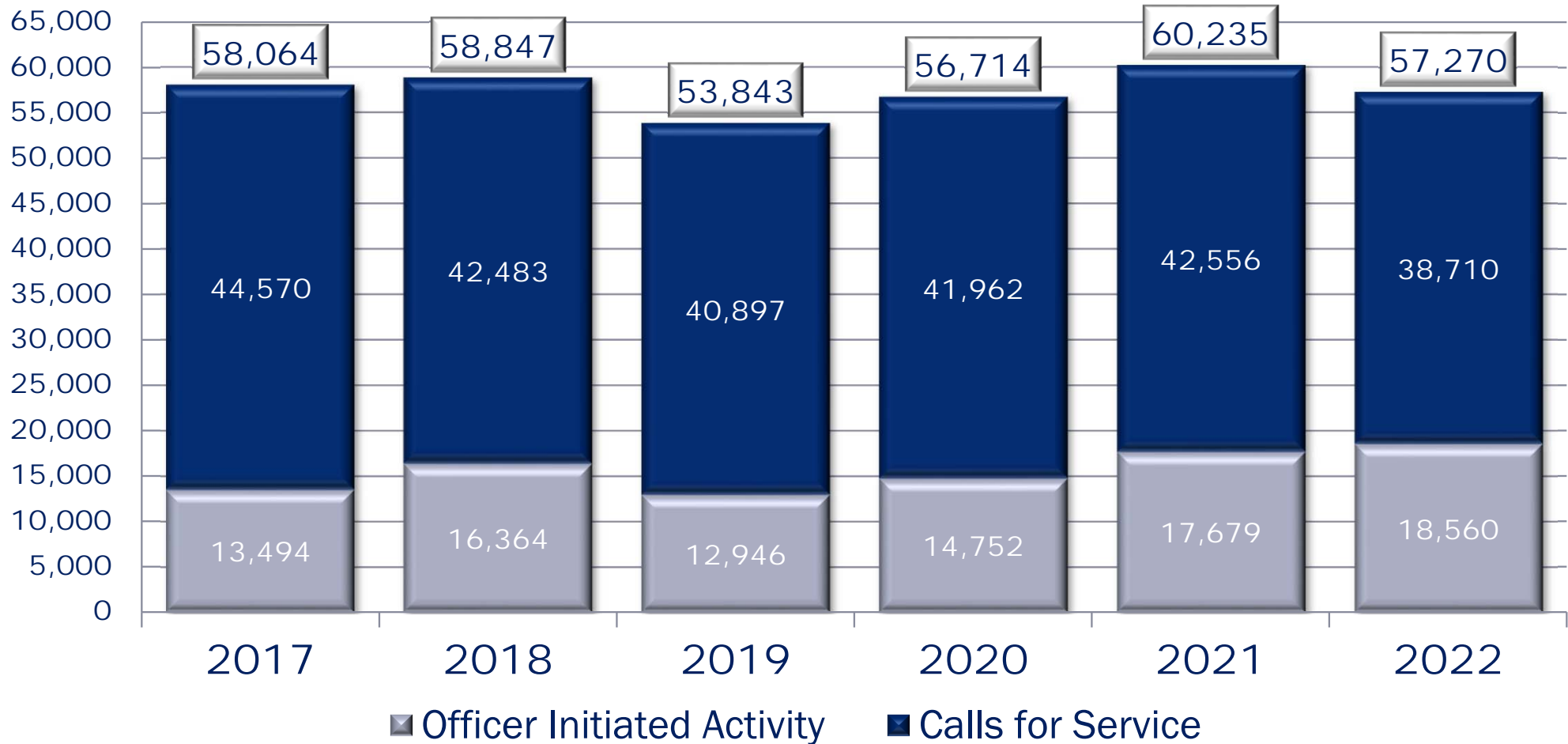

Officer Initiated Activity includes contact between the public and law enforcement that is not a direct response to a call for service. Examples: traffic stop, directed patrol, business check, pedestrian/bike check and community outreach.

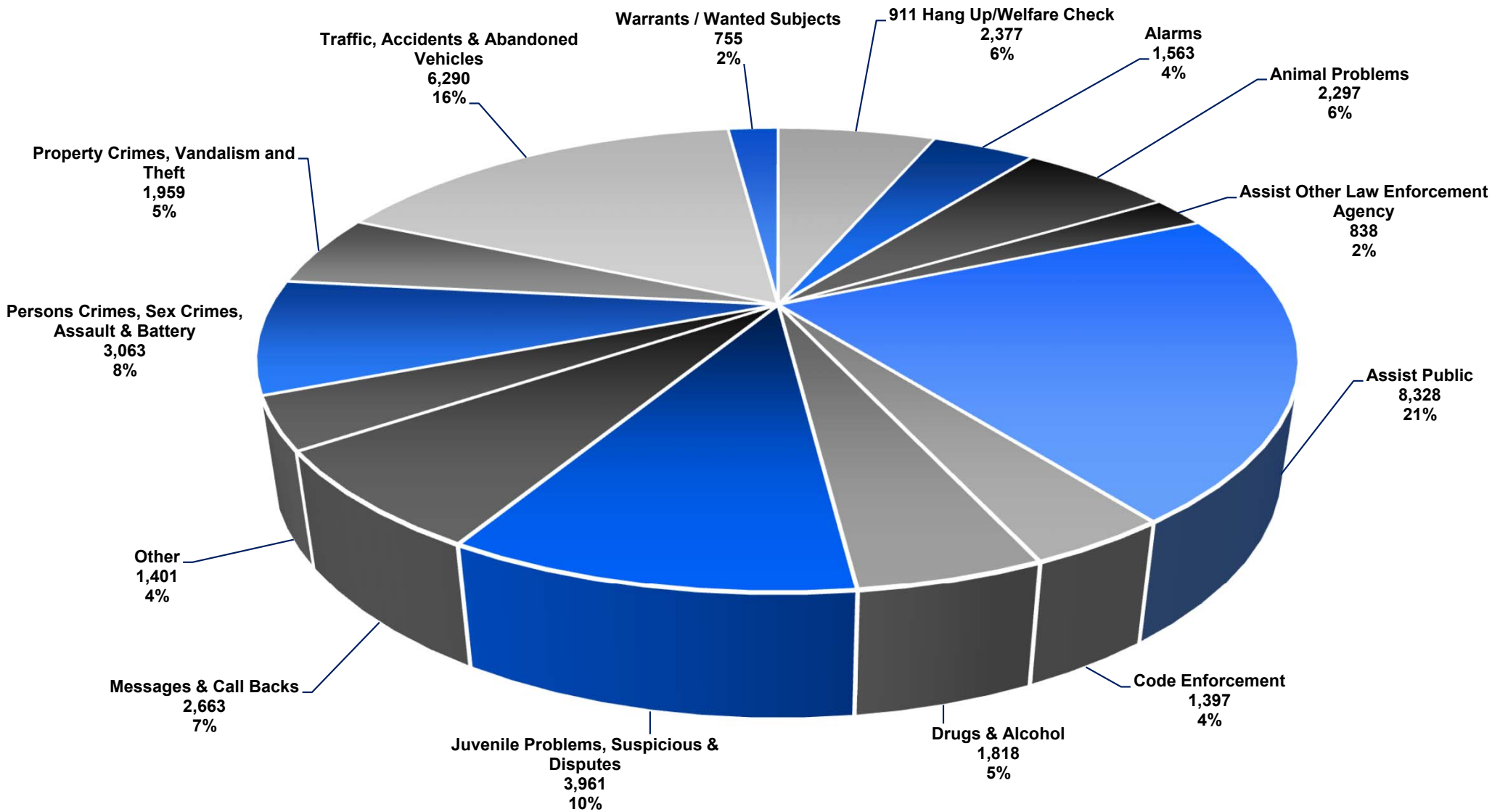
In February of 2017, the Coeur d'Alene Police Department began tracking this type of activity.

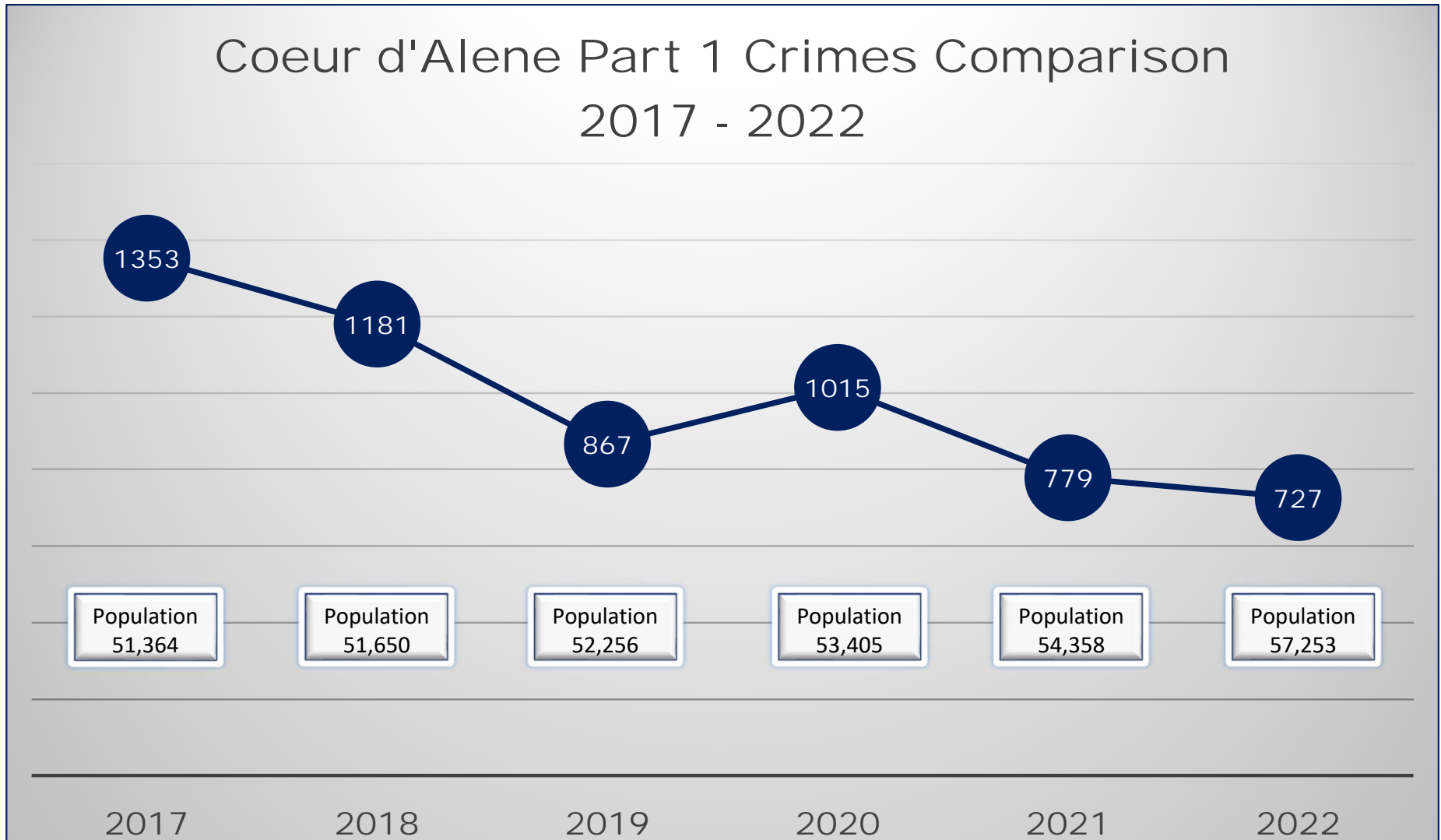

CRIME TREND WITH POPULATION

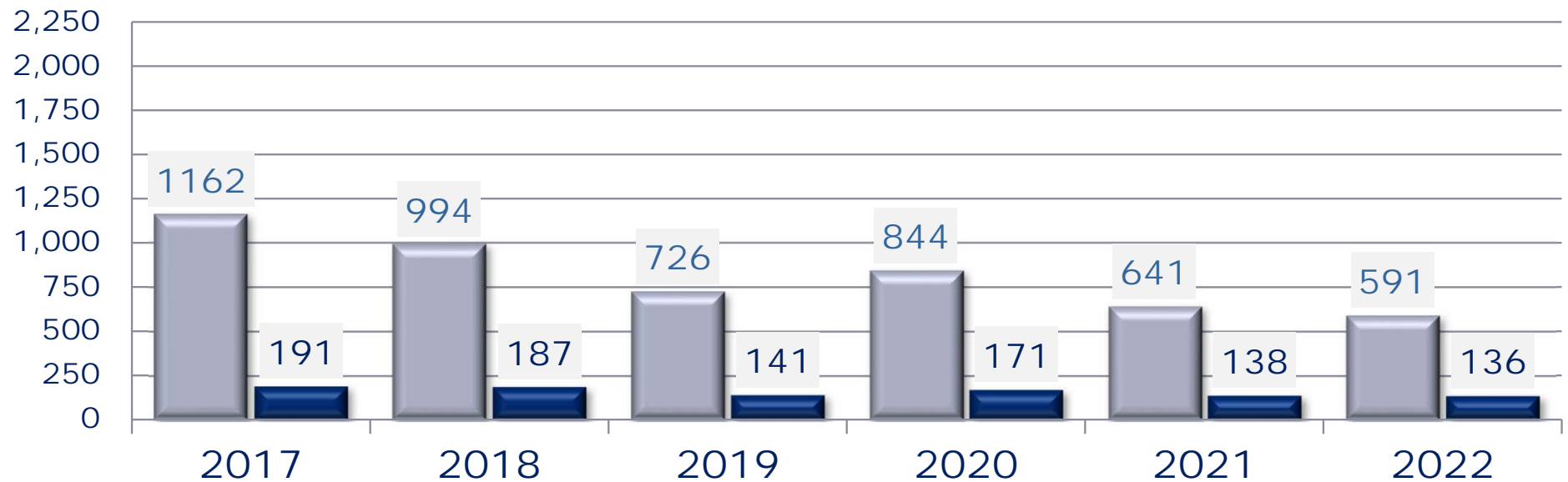

Part 1 & 2 Crime Arrests by Year

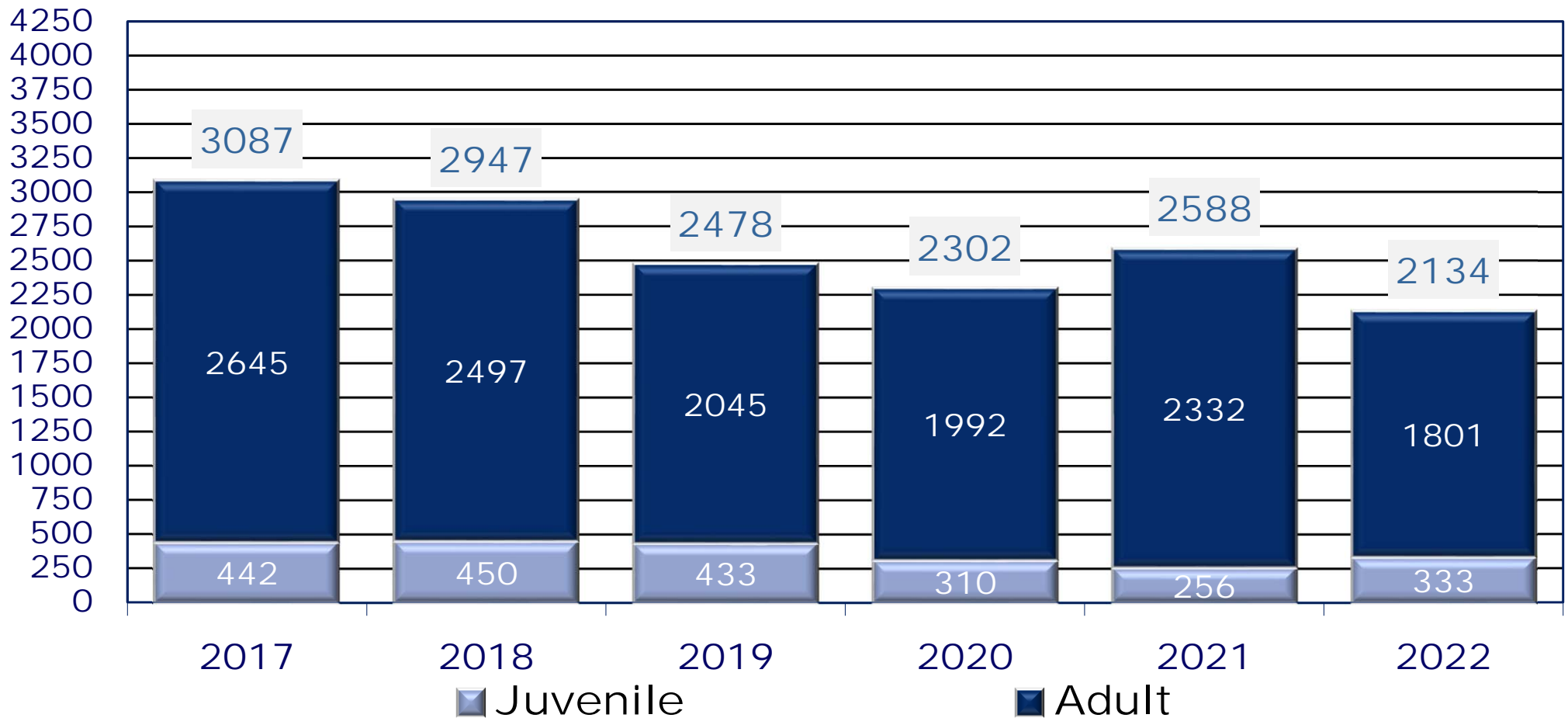

Adult, Juvenile & Total Arrests

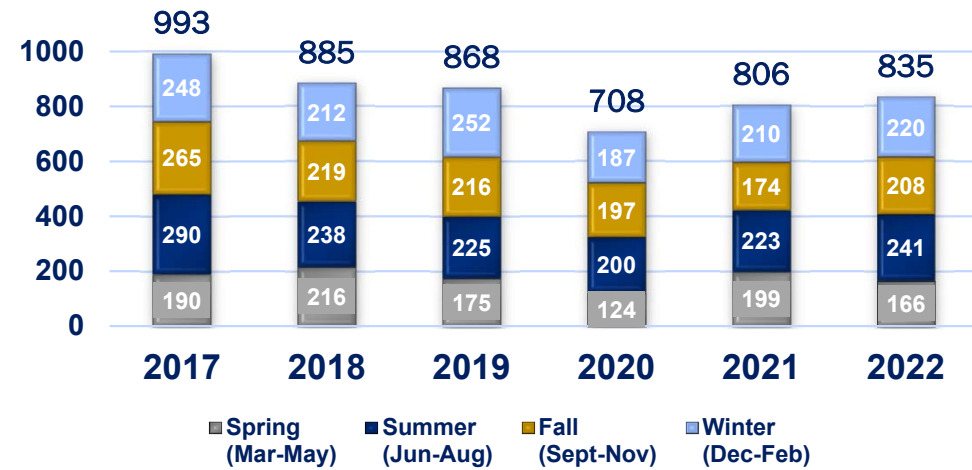

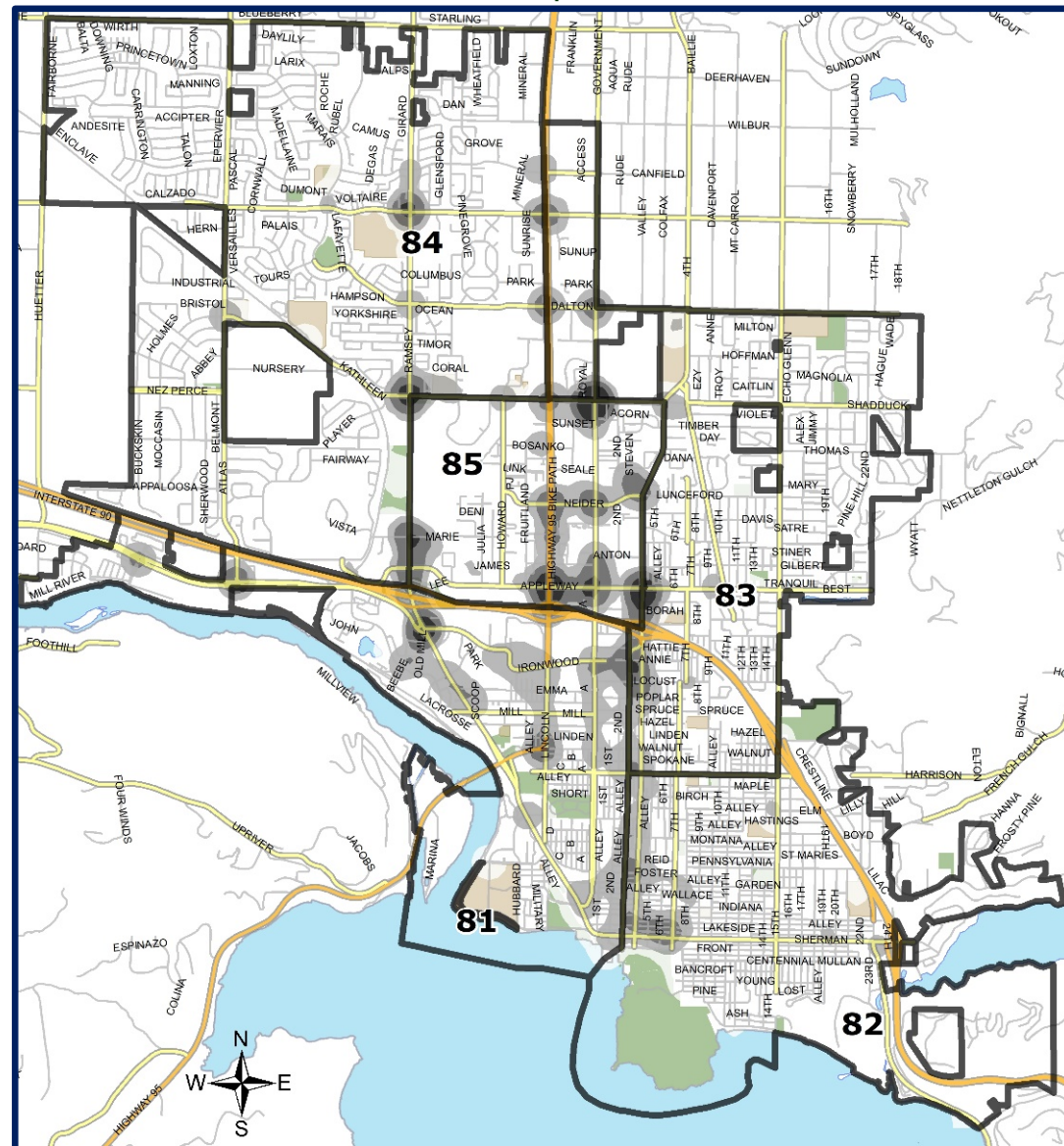
Accidents by Year & Season

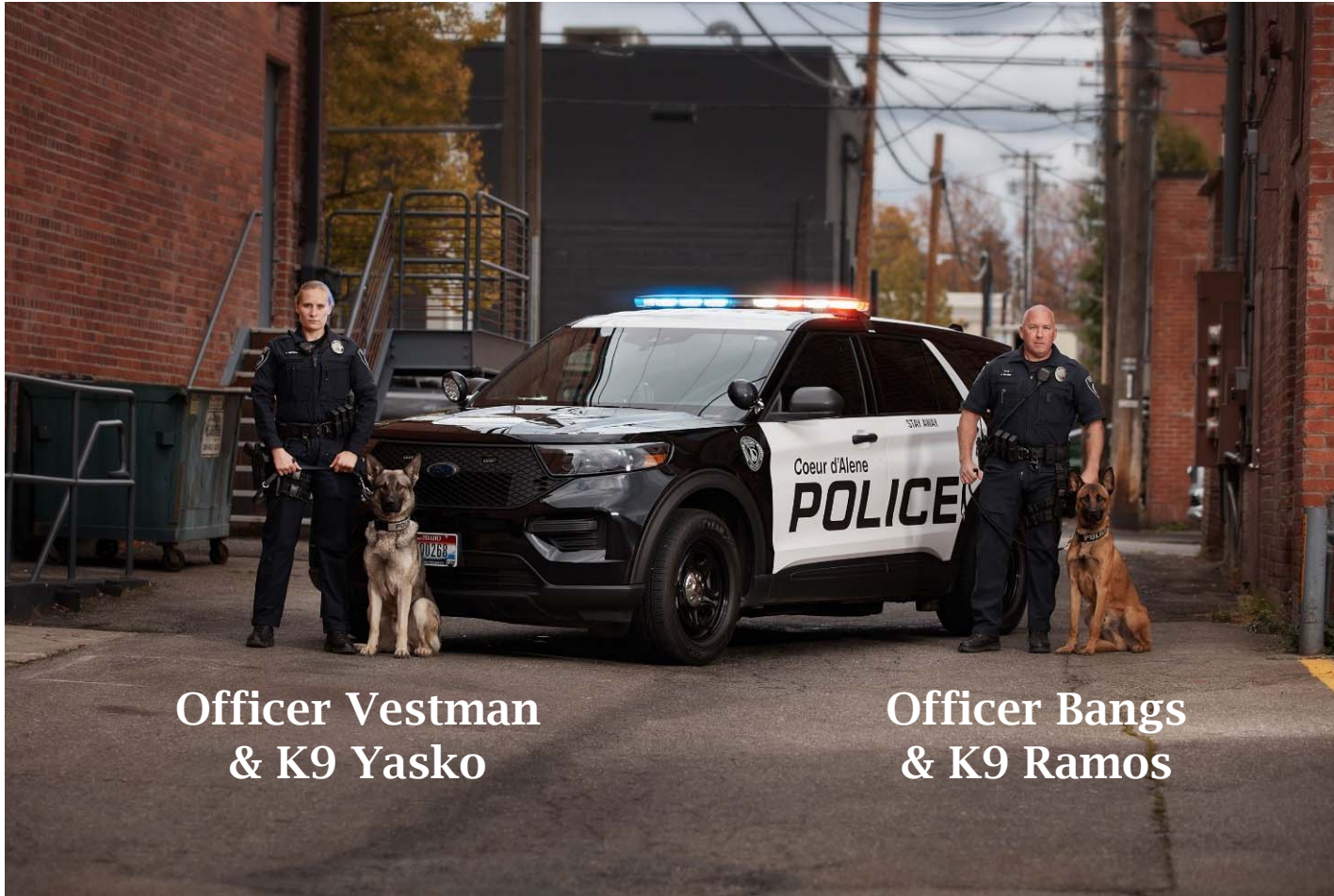


In Memory of CDAPD K9 Halo

It's with profound sadness that the Coeur d'Alene Police Department announces the passing of K9 Halo. K9 Halo began working at the PD in February of 2016 and worked with two different partners. During his career, K9 Halo was deployed 1,265 times assisting CDAPD officers along with law enforcement throughout Kootenai County. K9 Halo was involved in 240 fugitive arrests. He was also involved in 386 drug related arrests. Due to declining health, K9 Halo retired from service in September of this year. K9 Halo was loved by the entire department and will be greatly missed.

Coeur d'Alene Police: Programs

Citizens Police Academy

The Academy is structured as an informational program to give citizens a broad-based understanding of the Coeur d'Alene Police Department and provides opportunities for open discussion with agency leaders, patrol officers and detectives.

Academy participants will learn how the police department operates and gain an understanding of the challenges facing law enforcement in our rapidly growing community.



Volunteer Program

Our 16 civilian volunteers spent just over 2,600 hours serving the department in 2022.

Volunteers spend time serving Investigations, Patrol, Records, Community Relations Unit and COPS (Citizens on Patrol) program.



Explorer Program

The program is designed for young people who may be interested in a career in law enforcement. Some of the services that Explorers provide are assisting at community functions and traffic direction.

During the year, Explorers will have the opportunity to work directly with the Coeur d'Alene Police Department and, in doing so, gain knowledge and insight regarding medical emergencies, domestic disturbances, directing traffic, firearms training, crime scene processing, traffic stops and others.

Neighborhood Watch Program



During the past seven years, crime in Coeur d'Alene has dropped significantly. A large portion of that success is due to the partnership the police department has with citizens in the community involved in various programs including our Neighborhood Watch. The Neighborhood Watch program is an information sharing partnership between neighborhoods and the police department, allowing the police department to target specific crime and quality of life related problems within the neighborhood.

The Coeur d'Alene Police Department is looking to expand our Neighborhood Watch program. Each Neighborhood Watch group is comprised of residents in a small geographical area, generally one or two city blocks. Each group is led by a citizen Block Watch Captain and an assistant. The captain is the point of contact for the neighborhood and the liaison with the police department. The captain provides information to the police department related to crime or quality of life issues within the neighborhood. Neighborhood Watch groups meet annually, often during the summer, where neighbors can get to know each other and contact information can be exchanged or updated. The captain maintains the contact information for the neighborhood.

Although we currently have Neighborhood Watch groups in different areas of the city, the program's success is dependent on the activity of each group along with adding additional groups to the program.
