This year, on May 15, at 4:30 p.m., the Coeur d'Alene Police Department, along with other community leaders, will assist with the unveiling of the K27 Forever Memorial. This memorial will, in part, honor the sacrifice of



Sergeant Greg Moore who died in the line of duty on May 5, 2015.

Coeur d'Alene Mayor Steve Widmyer and the Panhandle Parks Foundation have spent the last three years working with donors throughout the community to fund this special project. Architect Jon Mueller completed the design of the large water feature that is located in McEuen Park.
