Leaf-Fest '15 Kicks Off November 16

If you haven't done so already, now is the time to rake leaves and pine needles into your street in preparation for the city's free leaf pick-up program, which begins next Monday. Crews will begin the pick-up south of Sherman Avenue and work their way north from west to east. Last year, leaf collection was completed in 10 days as the street department hauled 791 dump truck loads of leaves totaling 1,688 tons.
