What is a GO bond?

It is a voter approved debt to be repaid with property taxes.







2015 Public Safety GO Bond

The proposed 2015 public safety GO Bond will lower the levy rate as compared to the 2005 voter approved bond







Levy Rate

The property tax cost per \$1,000 in valuation






Fire Station #4

GO Bond - Police Department

- Mobile Command/Crime Scene trailer and vehicle -\$255,540 and \$35,368, respectively
- Public Safety Camera Network \$230,000
- Investigator vehicles \$174,839
- Parking area for patrol vehicles with electrical outlets \$229,253
- Total = \$925,000

Public Safety Camera Network

Cameras will be installed and/or replaced at Fire Administration/Station #1, #2 and #3, Cherry Hill/Fallen Heroes Park, City Hall, McEuen Park, Police Department Headquarters, Streets and Water Department, and the proposed public safety garage.







Police Vehicles

- The Police Department has 17 vehicles with 100,000+ miles. Additionally, Police Department units idle an average of 600 hours per year to keep computer and electronic equipment running during their shift, which equates to an additional 19,000+ miles per year.
- The Police Department has a total of 20 vehicles that are over 10 years old.
- The Department is requesting replacement of just 7 vehicles.







Parking area and electrical outlets for patrol vehicles

- Currently, patrol cars must remain running throughout the shift to keep the computer and electronics functioning, and the large amount of idle time reduces fleet life and increases maintenance costs.
- Covered parking area with outlets will provide greater efficiency for patrol fleet.
