Message from the Chief:








PART 1 CRIME by Crime Group

Part 1 & 2 Crime Arrests by Year



Adult, Juvenile & Total Arrests



Calls for Service: 2018 - 2023




Officer Initiated Activity


Types of calls that Code Enforcement typically handles include:


Accidents by Year & Season

Coeur d'Alene Police: Volunteer Program

Volunteers spend time serving Investigations, Patrol, Records, Community Relations Unit and COPS (Citizens on Patrol) program.

Our 16 civilian volunteers spent just over 1,799 hours serving the department in 2023. During this time they handled 740 abandoned vehicles and issued 667 parking related citations.

Success in Downtown CDA

Compared to previous years, the summer of 2023 in downtown has been peaceful, and much of the credit goes to the city's downtown enforcement unit and a bond between police and downtown businesses.

It's the first summer a five-officer task force was dedicated to downtown. Their constant presence made a difference.

From June to August this year, police calls for service and officerinitiated calls totaled 1,224. That's down from 1,406 last year, and 1,604 in 2021.

From two years ago, police calls and officer-initiated activity this summer were down more than 2<u>0%</u>.
