A ceremonial groundbreaking on the construction of the K27 Memorial project will be held on Thursday, September 7, at 5:30 p.m., at McEuen Park's pedestrian bridge. The completely privately fundraised project is to honor Coeur d'Alene Police Department Sgt. Greg Moore, killed in the line of duty in 2015, along with all fallen law enforcement officers. Fundraising on the first phase of construction has been successfully completed, though the Panhandle Parks Foundation is inviting community members to continue to donate to help provide for additional amenities such as benches, landscaping material, lighting and more. 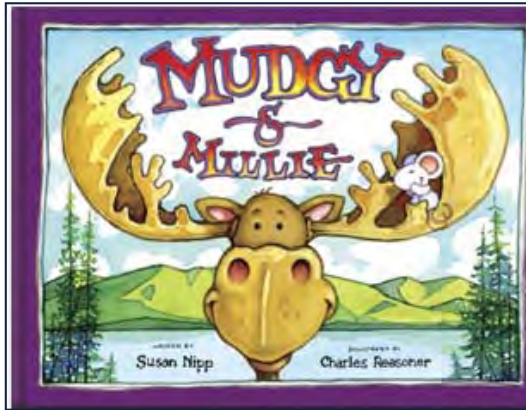

This includes managing the following: Emergency Minor Home Repair and Accessibility Program, Community Opportunity Grants, grant budget, HUD reporting, and providing technical assistance to applicants as well as working collaboratively with all agencies to generate maximum public awareness and participation. This year I will be working on drafting a new five-year plan based on area need and community participation. I'm very excited to begin digging into that.

What do you want people to know about the CDBG Program?

The CDBG program is really the people's program of Coeur d'Alene. Funds are directed by the needs
